Michigan unemployment claims continue to fall, but remain high - Adrienne Roberts, Detroit Free Press. July 30th

The number of new Michigan residents filing for unemployment benefits continued to decline last week, although claims remain at historically high levels.

New claims dropped to 21,949 in the week ending July 25, down from 24,596 the previous week, the U.S. Department of Labor reported Thursday. Last year at this time, there were about 5,000 new unemployment claims in the state.

Nationally, new unemployment claims increased to 1.43 million that week, up from 1.42 million the week prior, a troubling sign for the country's economic recovery.

Michigan's claims peaked in early April, with nearly 400,000 new claims the week ending April 4. After steadily dropping since then, claims nearly doubled at the end of June from the week prior, as coronavirus cases began to rise again and the state's economic reopening was paused. While new claims have slowly declined since then, the spike underscored concerns over a slower economic recovery than expected.

The data comes the day following moves by Gov. Gretchen Whitmer that could result in more layoffs — Whitmer dialed back the economic reopening in northern Michigan, banning indoor alcohol sales in nightclubs and other establishments that mostly serve alcohol. That restriction already is in place in much of central and southern Michigan.

Whitmer did say Detroit's three casinos can open at greatly reduced capacity Aug. 5, but Michigan's economic reopening has generally been paused for weeks following the renewed rise in coronavirus cases

A federal \$600 unemployment benefit that economists say provided a lifeline for Michigan residents out of work has ended. The benefit expired July 25 in Michigan, so moving forward, claimants receiving unemployment benefits or new filers will collect money only from the state, which maxes out at \$362 a week.

Congress is negotiating an extension of the deal, but it's unclear whether it would be for the full \$600, or a lesser amount.

The state has struggled to get benefits in the hands of filers, especially earlier on in the pandemic, as it grappled with an influx of claims and fraud attempts. The state said Friday it has paid out more than \$19 billion in benefits to 2 million filers since March 15, or about 98% of claimants.
